

Knitting Pattern for Bernard's clippers

A lovely pair of shears to make sure Bernard clips his cock to perfection!



You will need:

Card

PVA glue

Grey DK yarn


Black DK yarn

Beige DK yarn

2.5 mm needles

Small amount of stuffing

Miniature black button



Instructions:

Cut out two pieces of cardboard from shears template.

Coat blades with thin layer of PVA glue, and starting from the handle end, wind the grey yarn carefully around each blade, leaving no gaps for card to show through. When you reach the tip of the blade, leave 10 cms of yarn. Set aside to dry thoroughly - you may have to put a small peg or paper clip over the end to prevent the yarn from unravelling. When dry, with a sharp needle, thread trailing end very carefully through wool on blade to hide end. Add extra drop of PVA to secure if necessary.

Handles (make 2)

In beige yarn, Cast on 6 sts

Row 1: K

Row 2: P

Row 3: Inc 1, K2, M1, K2, Inc1 (9 sts)

Knit 15 rows stocking stitch starting with a purl row

Row 19: K2tog, K2, K2tog, K1, K2tog (6sts)

Row 20: Purl 6

Cut yarn, leaving tail for sewing. Thread yarn through remaining 6 stitches and pull tight; fasten but do not cut yarn; sew seam to cast on edge. Do not cut yarn. Stuff half of handle, then slide unwrapped end of blades into the hole, add stuffing either side of card to obtain rounded shape. With end of yarn, stitch around cast on edge and gently pull tight around card and fasten off.

With a small length of black yarn, using a needle, thread up through handle, hiding end and coming out at cast on edge of handle. Wrap once round handle and fasten securely, then wrap several times around join between handle & blade, fasten securely and pass end back down through handle to hide.





Place your completed blades & handles with straight edges of blades facing each other. Using a sharp needle, make a hole through the card at the base of each blade. Using a needle & thread, secure thread to wool above hole on blade that will be top most. Pass thread through one hole of your button and slide button into place in centre of blade above the hole you have made. Pass needle & thread through other hole of button and through hole in blade, then through corresponding hole in the other blade. When returning thread back through holes, make sure you have caught a couple of strands of the wrapped wool to anchor the joint. Pass thread through several times and fasten off on the side without button, weave in end.



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
